
We gained three new Auxiliaries and there are another three in the pipeline.

Finally thank you to all the wonderful staff at RSL NSW, especially State Secretary, Jeff O'Brien and Dianne Naylor, Executive Support Officer for their help & support.



Now Auxiliary Members are included in the RSL NSW Constitution there has been some confusion as to the status of members who are also Service or Affiliate Members of RSL NSW .

In response to a question from a sub-Branch about membership, the State Secretary has provided the following advice.

"By way of background, when the Women's Auxiliary operated as a separate entity and members of the Auxiliary were not members of the RSL, Service and Affiliate Members could also hold membership of the Auxiliary. This was because the Auxiliary membership was not recognised in the Constitution, nor were Auxiliary members recorded on the RSL NSW membership database. At that time, the entire membership structure of the Auxiliary network was completely separate to RSL NSW.

Since then, Auxiliary membership has been included as a class of membership in the Constitution. This change affected some Auxiliary membership in as far as a member of RSL NSW has never been able to hold two classes of membership e.g. you cannot be a Service and Affiliate member. Any member who was a Service or Affiliate member and an Auxiliary member at the time when Auxiliary members were added to the Constitution, will only be recorded as a Service or Affiliate member in the current RSL NSW database. If we are aware of any awards a Service or Affiliate member may have received from their involvement with the Auxiliary, we can record these on the members profile e.g. Auxiliary Life Membership or a Certificate of Merit and Gold Badge as the case may be.

The way that the situation about continued participation of Service and Affiliate members in the Auxiliary was resolved is contained in SOP 8 item 2.2 which states: "Members of the RSL Auxiliary will be Auxiliary Members. Any other RSL NSW Members may, at the invitation of the RSL Auxiliary participate in, and assist with RSL Auxiliary activities." This means that Service and Affiliate Members can maintain their class of membership while also supporting the work of the Auxiliary by attending their meetings and activities like fundraising.

The main point to remember is that the Auxiliary is now part of the sub-Branch and as such both entities should be working as one, toward the common goal of supporting veterans and their families in their community. The class of membership that is applicable to individual members should be guided by the eligibility criteria contained in Appendix B of the Constitution however the class of membership should not inhibit a person's involvement with the activities that support the charitable purpose of the sub-Branch.

I hope that provides some clarity on the matter."

THE NOWRA VETERAN WELLBEING CENTRE

When I first joined the Auxiliary many moons ago, I felt any funds raised by the Auxiliary should be used for veterans within the local community, I had no idea of the need beyond those boundaries. It was only when I became involved with the former CCWA that I came to appreciate the work done by DefenceCare now known as RSL LifeCare Veteran Services. I realised that we owe a debt to all our veterans not only to those in my local area. This is when I came to believe that we need to work as one, not individual Auxiliaries.

Like me, a lot of people didn't understand the vital work that RSL LifeCare Veteran Services did and sadly some still don't. On Monday 5th December 2022, RSL LifeCare officially opened a second Veterans Wellbeing Centre, this time in Nowra, a purpose built, state-of-the-art venue to provide an expanded range of health and wellbeing services for veterans, current serving Australian Defence Force members, and their families in the Shoalhaven region.

Supported by the Australian Government and RSL NSW, the centre will support up to 20,000 veterans and their families across the region. Support and services offered includes across health, education and skills, housing, social support and connection, employment, income and finance, and recognition and respect.

RSL LifeCare CEO Janet Muir said the occasion and centre opening had long been anticipated and was welcomed by the local community, particularly the many veterans, current serving members of the ADF and their families living in Nowra and surrounding areas.

"Our service men and women are supported as part of their time in the Australian Defence Force (ADF), and we want to ensure that support continues once they leave active service."

"RSL LifeCare recognises the importance of supporting those who have given so much to protect our country – a sentiment also recognised by the Department of Veterans' Affairs and RSL NSW, both of whom I want to thank for their funding and support of this centre and the service it will provide."

RSL NSW President Ray James said veteran communities have witnessed the benefits of these Hubs in action since the Nowra and Riverina Veteran Wellbeing Centres were established, and that RSL NSW and RSL LifeCare have a strong business case to support how the organisations can operate the centres using their combined resources.

"RSL NSW is committed to supporting the centres for one reason; we know they work," Mr James said.

"Since 2021, RSL NSW sub-branches have donated over \$5.2 million to RSL LifeCare to support the ongoing delivery of services to veterans and their families and I welcome the commitment from the Australian Government to expand the Veterans' and Families' Hub network.

"RSL NSW and RSL LifeCare are uniquely positioned to operate Veterans' and Families' Hubs in New South Wales."

Federal Minister for Veterans' Affairs and Defence Personnel, the Honourable Matt Keogh MP said the veterans' and families' hubs were a fantastic resource to support the whole veteran community.

"Every community is different and I'm so glad RSL LifeCare, Open Arms and Invictus are working together to provide the integrated supports that veterans and families need in and around Nowra," Minister Keogh said.

"The Government is committed to providing practical services and supports to Defence personnel, veterans and families to ensure a better future for the veteran community."

Centre Manager and veteran (USMC), Jason Grimes said he looked forward to continuing to collaborate with local veterans to enhance their opportunities and experiences amongst communities.


"The Nowra Veteran Wellbeing Centre reflects the needs of the local region and is a place where veterans and their families can come and talk to one another, learn from one another and seek assistance from staff, many of whom are veterans themselves," Mr Grimes said.

In addition to RSL LifeCare Veteran Services staff being located at the centre, staff from Open Arms – Veterans and Families Counselling and Invictus Australia will be co-located there, building the one-stop shop model for veterans and their families that is at the centre of the Veteran Wellbeing Centre strategy. The spaces within the centre will also be available for local ESOs to access and engage with veterans

Nowra is home to three separate defence bases in the local area.

The Nowra Veteran Wellbeing Centre was made possible through a \$5million grant from the Australian Government, as part of the Veterans' and Families' Hubs Network

All of the quilts are extraordinary beautiful but I would like to showcase this particular quilt not only is it stunning it could not be more appropriate.





This quilt was presented to Rear Admiral Jonathan Earley CSC, who is a third highest senior officer in the Royal Australian Navy (RAN).





Rear Admiral Jonathan Earley, CSC, RAN joined the Royal Australian Navy as a Maritime

Warfare Officer in January 1990 from Perth, Western Australia. He has deployed extensively on many maritime operations and exercises throughout Asia, the Pacific, the Middle East as well as the Atlantic, Mediterranean and Caribbean.

His command appointments have included the Anzac Class frigate, HMAS *Ballarat* (2011-12) and the Canberra Class Landing Helicopter Dock, HMAS *Adelaide* (2017-18). In 2017 he was also appointed as the Task Group Commander for the Australian Defence Force's inaugural Indo-Pacific Endeavour regional engagement activity, a high profile event that witnessed the largest Australian joint-maritime task group to have deployed to Asia in over 40 years.

Rear Admiral Earley assumed the role of Deputy Fleet Commander in January 2021. He subsequently assumed the position of Commander Australian Fleet in June 2022 and was promoted to Rear Admiral on 17 July 2022.



Ashore, he has also served in a variety of challenging staff roles at the operational and strategic level. Notable appointments have included tenures as the Director-General United States Force Posture Initiatives and the Australia-Singapore Military Training Initiative, Chief of Staff to the Chief of Navy and Director of Maritime Operations located in Headquarters Joint Operations Command.

Rear Admiral Earley is a distinguished graduate of the Australian War College, having completed the Australian Command and Staff Course in 2008 and the Defence Strategic Studies Course in 2019. For the latter course he was awarded the Deakin University Academic Excellence prize for his research into the Australia-US security relationship in the Indo-Pacific.

As part of the 2017 Australia Day Honours, he was awarded the Conspicuous Service Cross for "outstanding achievement and devotion to duty in maritime operational and humanitarian response planning and deployment.

ANZAC & REMEMBRANCE DAY TOKENS

A significant number of tokens formerly owned by WBI are available to sub-Branches and can now be ordered online. Sub-Branches will be required to pay a small packing (\$0.25 cents per token) and freight charge, however there is no charge for the tokens.

How to create an account and place an order: Go to the online ordering portal rslnsw.pmashop.co Create an account login by clicking 'Continue' under 'New Customer' and completing your details. Please ensure you enter your official sub-Branch email address in the email field (which automatically also becomes your username) Your account will usually be authorised the same business day, at which point you will receive an email notification. Once you receive authorisation, you will be able to login and place orders using your username and password.

The beginning of the year is the time you need to plan your recruiting and fundraising strategy so as the Coordinator can prepare a report to be presented to the sub Branch prior to their Annual General Meeting.
